It has certainly been a busy time in the Pacific as we moved into the *Niu Vaka* Pacific Strategy and launched the MFAT-funded SRH in Emergencies program in Cook Islands, Kiribati and Tuvalu. We've had several high-profile visitors to our clinics, hosted four regional trainings and driven Pacific representation at CSW and Women Deliver. In addition, we've continued to expand our work delivering SRH services to some of the most marginalised communities in the Pacific and advocating for greater support for sexual and reproductive rights.

The next six months will be similarly busy and exciting. This week, SROP staff and Pacific Member Associations are in Kuala Lumpur, with the rest of the ESEAOR family, to discuss successes and opportunities for growth and to look to the future of the Federation as a whole. We look forward to the outcomes of these discussions and to building on our successes over the next six months.

The Global IPPF Annual Report is also available now. The report summarises progress made towards achieving the Strategic Framework 2016-2022 so that everyone can realise their sexual and reproductive health and rights. VFHA Planem Gud Famili Report

In June, Vanuatu Family Health Association (VFHA) launched their Planem Gud Famili Blong Yumi report ("Let's Plan our Family"). The report is part of VFHA's Healthy Islands initiative, supported by Family Planning New Zealand, which focuses on four remote communities in Santos and North Pentecost. VFHA engage traditional leaders as SRHR champions, providing them with accurate information to pass on to their communities.

This led to an increase in contraceptive use in the targeted communities and condom dispensers can now be seen hanging from the trees in one village! The Jadelle implant was also a popular option, with community members travelling to the nearest health centre to request the implant.

On 12th June, Dr Sharman Stone, Australian Ambassador for Women and Girls and External Advisor to IPPF's Governing Council, visited Tuvalu Family Health Association (TuFHA) as part of her visit to Tuvalu. VCAT Training

From 25th to 28th, MA representatives and SROP staff attended a four-day Values Clarification and Attitudes Transformation (VCAT) Training of Trainers in Suva. VCAT encourages participants to reflect on their own values with a view to improving patient care. Additionally, the ToT gave participants the opportunity to improve their training skills and practice the VCAT activities, ahead of returning to their workplaces where they will act as the VCAT focal point.

The training was facilitated by Evangeline Weiss and co-facilitated by Deepesh Gupta, from IPPF's South Asia Regional Office, who has done extensive work on values clarification. We will share more information about this training and its roll out across the region in due course.

WASH and SRHR

IPPF is proud to co-author A Shared Agenda: Exploring links between water, sanitation, hygiene, and sexual and reproductive health and rights in sustainable development with WaterAid and other partners. The report recognises that water and sanitation and SRH are essential for achieving the SDGs and provides recommendations for organisations working in each sector for greater coordination. Pacific Society for Reproductive Health Conference



PNGFHA ED, Michael Salini, also features on a plenary panel on the unmet need for Family Planning and investing in Adolescent SRH.

Following the launch of the MFAT-funded SRH in Emergencies program, KFHA held the first meeting with key national stakeholders, including the Red Cross, the Disaster National Coordinator, Ministry of Health, the local Disabled Persons Organisation and UNFPA. This is the first step to ensuring that sexual and reproductive health is integrated into humanitarian responses.
